





# Chechu Álava. Rebels

27 January to 29 March 2020 Balcony Gallery, 1<sup>st</sup> floor. Free entry Curator: Rocío de la Villa

From 27 January to 29 March 2020 the Museo Nacional Thyssen-Bornemisza will be presenting the exhibition *Chechu Álava*. *Rebels*, a **gallery of female portraits** that celebrates the imaginary life of ancient myths and the experience of eminent women in the modern age. This ongoing series, first started by the artist a decade ago, has already brought together Eve and Venus with intellectuals, writers and artists such as Simone de Beauvoir, Hannah Arendt, Sylvia Plath, Colette, Marga Gil Roësset, Niki de Saint Phalle, Eva Hesse, Tina Modotti, Frida Kahlo and Lee Miller. *Chechu Álava*. *Rebels* is the third edition in the **Kora programme**. Based on the myth of the first female portraitist in history recounted by Pliny the Elder, it presents one exhibition a year at the Museo Thyssen from a gender perspective.

With only a few exceptions, in the history of art women have always been depicted as wives and museum, constructs that reflect male desire. The present exhibition offers an opportunity to reflect on the genre of the portrait through this gallery of complex, uniquely talented and ground-breaking personalities who were often judged by the male world in which they fought to find a place. Both their lives and their careers were difficult. All were rebels in that they defied the norms represented by the myths of Venus and Eve, which in Chechu Álava's version humorously emphasise the traumas experienced by women in patriarchal societies. These figures are both rebels and heroines for the younger generations that are learning from their experiences and resilience.

It is this dimension as beacon and guide for later women that immediately strikes the visitor to this gallery of portraits illuminated through the painstaking technique of glazes. A type of painting which, when looked at again, encourages the viewer to linger on the blurred details and on the precise compositions. These generally solitary scenes evoke introspection and encourage a dialogue with the women seen in moments of relaxed privacy, sometimes vulnerable but also decisive. In the words of the exhibition's curator Rocío de la Villa, rather than representations they are inspiring presences.

The exhibition extends from the Balcony gallery on the 1<sup>st</sup> floor to other galleries of the Permanent Collection where Álava's works establish a dialogue with some of the museum's paintings: Daydreaming Girl (2018) and Dusk (1888) by Edvard Munch (Room 35); I'm a Rebel (2019) and Fränzi before a carved Chair (1910) and Kneeling Nude in front of Red Screen (c. 1911-1912) by Ernst Ludwig Kirchner (Room 36); Frida smoking in pink (2019) and Still Life with yellow Roses (1937) by Max Beckmann (Room 39); and Virgin Girl (2016) and The Virgin of the Village (1938-1942) by Marc Chagall (Room 45).

### Chechu Álava (Piedras Blancas, Asturias, 1973)

After graduating in Fine Arts from the faculty in Salamanca, in 1995 Chechu Álava received an Erasmus grant from the Gerrit Rietveld Academy in Amsterdam. She lived in London and Madrid before moving to Paris where she has lived and worked since 2001.

Álava began to participate in numerous group exhibitions from 1994 onwards and at national and international art fairs. Her work is represented in institutions such as the Museo de Bellas Artes de Asturias, the DKV Collection and that of the Ministry of Culture, as well as in private collections in Mexico, France, Colombia, Germany, Portugal, the United States and Spain.

In 2014 her work was selected by an international jury for inclusion in the book 100 Painters of Tomorrow published by Thames & Hudson.
